What are Study Roads?

Macon County CTP

- Roads whose primary function is to provide mobility in the interest of moving people and goods.
- Roads that are used more frequently or act as important connectors to other roads.

Guidelines for Identifying Study Roads

- All "NC", "US", and Interstates.
- All facilities identified as Strategic Transportation Corridors.
 US-23/US-441, US-74
- All facilities that carry significant level of traffic.
- Facilities going through multiple municipalities.
- Intermodal connectors (connects to airports, park and ride lots, bus stations, etc.)
- Roads that allow for a reasonable representation of travel patterns for connectivity.

Review of Previous Meeting

Following introductions, the Steering Committee reviewed the summary from the previous meeting held on May 2; no corrections were noted. The action items identified in the previous meeting were also reviewed to track progress; Rose Bauguess noted the Vision Statement action item was not completed and will be added to the list for today's meeting. All other action items (regarding completion of the Metroquest survey and promotional materials) were completed.

Summary of Agenda Items

Participants reviewed the agenda and the desired outcomes for today's meeting. The group decided to skip the first agenda item – Finalize the CTP Vision Statement – and work on it via email instead of during the meeting. The following desired outcomes were identified:

- 1. Identify Steering Committee roles in survey distribution and promotion
- 2. Steering Committee develops understanding of Highway Facility Types
- 3. Steering Committee makes recommendations for CTP Study Roads

Survey Distribution

The Metroquest survey is up and running and is getting a good response so far, based primarily on electronic distribution. The RPO bought a Facebook ad and the link has been shared extensively via email and social media. Rose showed the committee a few snapshots of the results so far.

The next push will be to reach people who may not receive it electronically. Paper postcards advertising the survey were sent home with all Macon County public school students before the end of the school year. Additional postcards and flyers were printed for distribution by the Steering Committee. Rose passed out a sign-up sheet for everyone to indicate locations where they can commit to distributing flyers.

Highway Facility Types and CTP Study Roads

Roger presented a summary of the Highway Facility Types for NC roadways. A question arose about unpaved roadways and the possibility of a divided two-lane road. He then tasked the Steering Committee with identifying the CTP Study Roads. Roads studied for the CTP analysis are the primary roads that move the majority of traffic or provide important connections to destinations. The committee was asked to review maps with the Study Roads from the previous CTP study, and discuss which ones to add/remove/update. The Committee recommended that Roller Mill Rd, Tellico Rd, and Siler Road be added, and that Ned Hill Rd and Leatherman Gap Rd be removed.

There was also discussion about the traffic related to two schools near the intersection of Clark Chapel Rd. and Wells Grove Rd. Roger will relay the concerns to NCDOT's Municipal School Transportation Assistance program.

Macon County Demographics and Commuting Patterns

Rose presented data from the US Census Bureau's tool <u>https://onthemap.ces.census.gov/</u> about Macon County's commuting times, methods, and directions. The committee was asked to weigh in on whether the data made sense and reflected the conditions they experience locally. One data point – 96 jobs in Knoxville, TN – raised some questions, and no one was immediately able to identify what jobs those might be.

Rose also highlighted the importance of mobility through our region by showing a screenshot from a mobile mapping application from Asheville to Atlanta. The preferred route changes depending on traffic conditions – sometimes it directs people on I-26 to I-85, but traffic is getting worse on I-26, so it is often faster to go US 23/441 through Macon County.

Wrap-Up

The committee reviewed the desired outcomes identified at the beginning of the meeting. It was agreed that all three desired outcomes were achieved.

Summary of Action Items

The following action items were identified during the meeting:

- Develop Summary of Meeting #3 (Rose)
- Revise the Vision Statement and distribute to the Steering Committee for review (Rose)
- Promote the survey and distribute flyers (all Steering Committee members)
- Consult with NCDOT MSTA staff about school traffic on Wells Grove Rd. (Roger)

- 55 mph or greater
- No driveways
- No Traffic Signals
- 4 lanes minimum with a Median



Example: US-441 (Sylva Road)

Expressways

- High Mobility, Low to Moderate Access
- 45 ~ 60 mph or greater
- Limited driveways
- Traffic Signals—Limited or Not Allowed
- 4 lanes minimum with a Median
- Multilane Divided

Boulevard



Example: US-23 (Patton Avenue)

- Moderate Mobility, Low to Moderate Access
- 30 ~ 55 mph or greater
- Driveways Allowed
- Traffic Signals Allowed
- 4 lanes minimum with a Median
- Multilane Divided

Facility Types Definitions

- 30 to 55 mph
- Driveways Allowed
- Traffic Signals Allowed

- 25 ~ 55 mph or greater
- Driveways Allowed
- Traffic Signals Allowed
- 2 lanes minimum
- Major Facilities

Minor Thoroughfares



Example: Lake Emory Road

- Moderate to Low Mobility, High Access
- 25 ~ 55 mph or greater
- Driveways Allowed
- Traffic Signals Allowed
- 2 lanes minimum; No Median
- Provides local access and connects Major Facilities
